

## DIRECTOR'S NOTE

I wish I could say this is the end of an era or something so grandiose. I am, after all, the last of the first Cabaret Improv Troupe that I'd worked with that's still here, though I'm sure at least one other member of that troupe will be in attendance. But the fact is that whenever new people came along, even last semester when the overwhelming majority of the cast was brand spanking new, they just seemed to fit into place in a short time. There have been no eras, but more like a stream of time washing through this theatre.

I also wish I could say I was the best performer ever to grace this troupe. I'm not even the best director. She has yet to helm the director's chair. I'm sure someone thinks that I'm the best, and I'll take this opportunity to thank that one deluded person. But I can say that the troupe has gotten better every semester. Not so much because of anything I've done, but because of the many talented and hard working people have been a part of these shows with me. Some stayed for a short time, and some have become good friends. The one problem with directing a troupe like this is that you have to start over every semester with new auditions. But having great people try out and become part of this troupe definitely makes this easier.

Because of their efforts, more people will see improvisation as an art. There are those who would beg to differ with me on that point, but what we'll do onstage is art. Many times during my time with the troupe, I've gone though some tough times. From fights with girlfriends, breakups with girlfriends, no girlfriends, potential girlfriends who stop calling me to serious doubts as to who I am, why I exist, and my importance in this life. As I struggled to believe and overcome these daunting obstacles in my life, there was always an improv rehearsal somewhere in the near future. And as much as I didn't want to go to rehearsal, or didn't want to laugh, I'd always go to rehearsal and laugh my ass off. It always seemed to be when I needed it most. I found therapy in this troupe.

Most people think of catharsis involves crying. For me, it's laughter. Whether it's me laughing, hearing a room full of people laugh, or, especially, a good

friend laugh this is what cleanses my soul. I don't

pretend to change people's life with my art. I'm not so pretentious. But I can change someone's day. Hopefully when those of you reading this leave, you'll feel a lot better. You'll forget about your troubles for a little while. They'll still be there when you leave, but damn you had a good time!

Thanks to my parents who made me possible and made me who I am, and my friends-past, present, and future-who help me get by. I love you all.
